## Religious Studies Major Checklist

First/ Second Year

Senior Seminar

The Religious Studies major introduces students to major religious traditions of the world and equips them to use methods from the humanities and social sciences to understand religious texts, art, doctrines, practices, ethics, institutions, and cultures. Coursework in the major develops key liberal arts competencies, including critical, analytical, and comparative thinking skills, intercultural awareness, an ability to view things from multiple perspectives, and effective written and verbal communication.

This checklist is intended as **general guideline** for planning your trajectory as a Religious Studies major. Please use it in consultation with your advisor. If you are a double major and need a religious studies advisor to help you navigate the requirements, please contact the department chair and one will be assigned to you.

The Religious Studies major requires 40 course hours, as follows:

- One "Gateway" course, numbered REL 110-176 (4 Hours)
- Two "Traditions" courses (8 Hours)
- REL 292 Approaches to the Study of Religion (4 Hours)
- 20 Elective Hours (including at least one 400-level topics seminar and no more than one additional lower-level course)
- REL 492 Senior Seminar (4 Hours)
