

Learning Outcomes Include:


- Develop a greater sense of empathy for others

Outdoor Learning Community

PROGRAMS & TRADITIONS



During the first six weeks, the neighborhood will host programs that focus on how to have a successful college experience.



Twice a semester, the Community Director in partnership with the RAs will host two neighborhood dinners. One of the neighborhood dinners will take place under the Oaks in hopes to target residents living in West, Virginia, and Sloan Halls. The second neighborhood dinner will occur on the HBB Basketball court in order to target students living in Hook/Brannock/Barney, Smith, and Carolina Hall.

Open Mic Night

Twice a semester, we will host an Open Mic night to allow the students in Historic and surrounding neighborhoods the opportunity to express themselves in creative ways such as singing, dancing, poetry, etc.



At the end of the Spring semester, Historic Neighborhood will host a block party in the neighborhood to celebrate the end of their first year. The event will include food trucks, games, and different activities to engage students to celebrate all their accomplishments.
