What is Beyond 12?

Beyond 12 is a comprehensive program that exposes middle school students to college and career educational sessions. This approach inspires students to continue their education, create a plan beyond high school, and increase college access by providing post-secondary education options and knowledge. It develops college and career readiness skills, encourages students to explore careers and find careers they are passionate about, and builds essential life skills, including social skills, self-discipline, self-motivation, and responsibility.

Middle Schools Program Launch

Beyond 12 sessions started in September 2024. Students attend two sessions per month during the academic year at their middle school campus. Currently, we serve 28 students. Graham Middle has 15 students, and Broadview Middle has 13 students. Each school is fortunate to have two dedicated teachers who actively engage with students and provide valuable support for program activities.

Program Highlights

Each student will maintain a portfolio, a personal testament to their journey of growth and self-discovery. The portfolio will be kept with program teachers who support our students at each middle school, containing evidence of their personal growth, exploration, and next steps. At the end of the program, students will complete a portfolio presentation, sharing critical items from this portfolio to tell their story of growth, readiness, and next steps to their parents.

Portfolios will include plans, checklists, self-assessments, college searches, reflective statements, financial guides, and other items listed in the curriculum guide. The list of portfolio materials is located at the front of each student's notebook. In addition, students will write a reflection titled "What stuck with you today?" to explain how their knowledge, abilities, or attitudes have changed.

Parents Corner Bits & Beyond

How Parents Can Help 8th Graders Be Prepared for College



To prepare an 8th grader for college, parents should encourage them to explore their interests, develop strong study habits, take challenging courses when possible, actively participate in extracurricular activities, maintain good grades, and start conversations about potential college paths and career goals, while also discussing the importance of financial planning for higher education.

Key areas to focus on:

Academic Performance:

- Challenge yourself: Encourage your child to take honors or advanced placement classes when available to prepare for college-level coursework.
- Develop good study habits: Emphasize time management, organization, and effective note-taking strategies.
- Seek help when needed: Talk to teachers or get tutoring if your child is struggling with a subject.
- Read regularly: Foster a love of reading by encouraging diverse genres and discussing what they read.

Exploring Interests and Career Paths:

- Discover passions: Encourage your child to try new activities, clubs, and volunteer opportunities to identify potential career interests.
- Research careers: Talk about different career paths related to their interests and the education needed to achieve them.
- Career assessments: Consider using online career assessments to help identify potential fields.

Extracurricular Activities:

- Get involved: Participate in clubs, sports, or other activities that align with their interests, demonstrating leadership and commitment.
- Quality over quantity: Focus on meaningful involvement in a few activities rather than spreading themselves too thin.

College Awareness and Planning:

- Visit college campuses: Take family trips to nearby colleges to experience the atmosphere and explore different types of
 institutions.
- Start researching colleges: Discuss factors like location, size, majors offered, and admissions requirements.
- · Financial aid exploration: Begin learning about financial aid options, including scholarships and grants.
- Communication and Support:
- ° Regular check-ins: Maintain open communication about schoolwork, challenges, and college aspirations.
- Build a strong relationship with counselors: Utilize guidance counselors to discuss course selections, college applications, and career planning.
- · Positive reinforcement: Celebrate successes and encourage resilience when facing setbacks.
