Winter 2024

Required Courses for First-Year Students

Contracts

5 credits, Professors Gabriel, Levine, & Molony

LAW6220

This course is a comprehensive study of the creation, transfer, and termination of contract rights and duties. Fundamental common law principles—such as the capacity to contract, mutual assent, consideration, and legality of subject matter—will be addressed. Pertinent portions of the Uniform Commercial Code, particularly Article 2 dealing with sales, will be covered. Fundamental principles relating to performance, enforceability, contract defenses, and remedies will be addressed.

Criminal Law

3 credits, Professor Fitzgerald & Friedland

LAW6300

This course is a study of substantive criminal law, including an examination of crimes and their elements. Specific common law and statutory crimes will be covered. Available defenses will also be explored.

Criminal Law Lab

1 credit, adjunct professors

LAW6350

In conjunction with the first-year Criminal Law course, the Criminal Law Lab tracks a simulated criminal law case and provides students with the opportunity to engage in basic lawyering tasks (including interviewing, negotiation, oral argument, and drafting) under the supervision of practicing criminal lawyers.

Introduction to Legal Studies (ILS)¹

OAS professors

LAW6050

This year-long course prepares students for the transition in teaching, learning, and assessment from their undergraduate or graduate school experience, continually assesses students' knowledge and skills development, and begins the process of preparing for the bar examination. The course begins in August and continues in the Fall, Winter, and Spring trimesters on designated days.

¹ ILS takes place mostly within the August term, then continues during each of the Fall, Winter, and Spring trimesters. Two credits for ILS are awarded at the end of the August term, and the other credit is awarded at the end of the Spring trimester.

Lawyering, Leadership, & Professionalism (LLP)²
Professors Contino Saumby & Leupold

LAW6840

This course equips students with core foundational skills and insights as they formally begin their legal careers. Students learn best practices around establishing a professional image through resume writing and networking, formal oral presentation, effective communication, and other strategies to maximize personal and professional development. In addition, students explore leadership topics, such as cultural competence, learning agility, authenticity, and the *26 Success Factors for Lawyers*, gaining personal insights into their approach to work, interpersonal relationships, and potential career interests.

Legal Method & Communication (LMC) II

2 credits, Dean Liemer, Professors Clodomir, Dineen, Minarcin, Ochs & Reddy LAW6690

LMC II builds on the skills taught in LMC I, with additional practice in the basic conventions of written legal analysis, while working on a more complex legal problem. The focus shifts from predictive legal writing in the law office setting to persuasive legal writing on behalf of a client, for submission to the court. Students conduct initial research on the client's problem, practice negotiating a settlement, and write a trial brief supporting a motion for summary judgment in the federal District Court. Relevant ethical considerations, project management skills, and other professionalism topics are included.

² LLP takes place mostly within the August term, then continues during each of the Fall, Winter, and Spring trimesters. One credit for LLP is awarded at the end of the August term, and the other credit is awarded at the end of the Spring trimester.

Spring 2024

Required Courses for First-Year Students

Business Associations

4 credits, Professor Molony

LAW 7100

This course covers basic corporate law, including formation, management, and dissolution of corporations, and the rights and duties of those involved with corporations. The law related to business organizations, such as partnerships and limited liability companies (LLC), also will be covered. Students interested in business law, including either transactional work (assisting clients to enter into agreements) or business litigation (disputes between business entities) may want to register for Business Associations in the Spring trimester. **Maximum enrollment 82 students.**

Evidence

4 credits, Professor Dunham

LAW 7300

This course develops familiarity with the techniques by which evidence of controverted facts is presented in litigation before judicial tribunals. The Federal Rules of Evidence, North Carolina Rules of Evidence, and common law rules are examined. Students interested in working with litigation or litigation-related topics, including in public service positions such as the District Attorney or Public Defender offices, may want to register for Evidence in the Spring trimester. Taking Evidence in the Spring trimester also prepares students for the Trial Practice and Procedure course in the second-year Fall trimester and for Residency placements in litigation environments. **Maximum enrollment 82 students.**

Introduction to Legal Studies (ILS)

1 credit, OAS professors

LAW 6050

This year-long course prepares students for the transition in teaching, learning, and assessment from their undergraduate or graduate school experience, continually assesses students' knowledge and skills development, and begins the process of preparing for the bar examination. The course begins in August and continues in the Fall, Winter, and Spring trimesters on designated days.

Lawyering, Leadership, and Professionalism (LLP)

1 credit, Professors Contino Saumby & Leupold

LAW 6840

This course equips students with core foundational skills and insights as they formally begin their legal careers. Students learn best practices for establishing a professional image through resume writing and networking, for oral presentation, effective communication, and other strategies to maximize personal and professional development. In addition, students explore leadership topics, such as cultural competence, learning

agility, authenticity, and the *26 Success Factors for Lawyers*, gaining personal insights into their approach to work, interpersonal relationships, and potential career interests.

Legal Method and Communication (LMC) III

2 credits, Dean Liemer; Professors Clodomir, Dineen, Minarcin, & Reddy;
Adjunct Professor Megan Reilly-Dreas

LAW 6740

This course builds and expands on the skills taught in LMC I & II, as students hone their analytical and legal writing skills. Students will learn additional techniques for persuasive advocacy. They will write a brief to the federal Court of Appeals and will prepare and deliver an appellate oral argument. In addition, students will learn to research legislative history and to include policy arguments effectively in their written and oral advocacy.

Property

5 credits, Professor Haile & Visiting Professor Mason Heidt

LAW 6400

This course is a study of rights and interests in real property. Topics covered include the acquisition of rights in property, estates and future interests, concurrent ownership, landlord-tenant relations, restrictive covenants, easements, mortgages, and issues relating to title.
