RE: Family Law & Juvenile Law Advising Memo

The following guidance on course selection and sequencing may be helpful for students interested in pursuing a career in family and juvenile law. We recommend that you enroll in all the “Essential Courses” listed to ensure that you have a solid foundation. You may then select additional courses and experiences that align most closely with your own interests and career goals.

These courses build the skill sets that you will need to succeed. Please note that not all of the courses listed are offered every year, and many have enrollment caps. To make the best course plan, review registration materials carefully each trimester and discuss available courses and sequencing with your faculty advisor.

I. Essential Courses

The following courses are **essential** for lawyers who plan to practice family and/or juvenile law. Because these courses may be prerequisites for advanced work, we recommend that you take these essential courses as early in your law school career as you are able.
